



Welcome back to a new school year. We are excited to see all returning families and those new to our OLA community.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Supervision

Morning supervision begins at 8:30 am and our first bell rings at 8:42 am. Students are asked to meet their teacher at their designated place outside each morning. Students will be dismissed at 3:47pm Mon – Thurs, and 12:42pm on Friday. We ask parents to pick up their child promptly as there is no supervision after school.

Attendance

If your child(ren) will be absent from school for any reason, please contact the office at 403-327-5028 to let us know. You can leave a message or email olaoffice@holyspirit.ab.ca All unexcused absences are followed up with a phone call.

Medication

If a student requires medication to be administered at school proper documentation must be completed by a doctor and parent. The forms are available in the office. These forms must be on file before any medication can be given. The school does not give out any over the counter medication such as Tylenol or cough medicine and we do not use antiseptic cream such as polysporin.

Contact Information

If there are any changes to your child's data, i.e.: address, phone number, emergency contacts, email address, etc. please inform the office. This information is vital so that the school can contact you in case of an emergency.

Nutrition Breaks

All students eat in their classrooms during nutrition breaks. There are <u>no microwaves</u> available so please pack lunches accordingly. Please ensure you send enough food for both breaks. If you send food that requires a spoon or fork, please send them. We **DO NOT** supply these items.

As part of our city's new guidelines, we need to sort all organic waste into separate bins. However, with the heat in our building, the challenge of managing waste for 200 people, and the worry about bad smells, we won't be able to dispose of organic waste at school.



To tackle this, we're starting a "Pack In, Pack Out" program. This means students should bring home everything from their lunch, including any leftovers. This will not only help us with waste

management but also give parents a better idea of what their kids are eating. To make this a little easier, please consider sending your child with a ziplock bag or a small plastic container for any lunch waste. Thanks for your help and support in keeping our school environment clean and efficient!

Food Allergies

In our school community there are students who have potentially life-threatening allergies (anaphylaxis) to certain foods. It is important to be aware and respectful of those who may have food allergies. Please inform your teachers and school staff about any allergies your child may have. Before bringing food items to the classroom, check with the homeroom teacher if there are any items to avoid. By being mindful and considerate of food allergies in the classroom, we can create a safe and inclusive environment for all students.


School Fees

All school fees for the 2024-25 school year are due by the end of September. All payments can be made on School Cash Online. If you prefer to pay by cheque or cash, you can always do so by visiting our office. Fees for Grades 1-6 are \$27.00 and the Kindergarten fee is \$51.00. Thank you in advance for your prompt attention to this matter.

Transportation

This year we have 3 buses. Please check the bus maps to confirm which bus your child(ren) will be riding. Information about bussing can be found here.

Permission Click

There will be 2 permission forms sent to you via email. One is our Digital Citizenship and the other is our yearly permission form. Please respond open both forms and submit your response.

Cell phones and wearable devices

All cell phones and wearable electronics (Apple watches, etc) must be turned off remain in the student's backpack throughout the day (including break times).

Smartwatches will need to be silenced and in watch mode only when worn to school.



NOTICE TO PARENT OR GUARDIAN OF RELIGIOUS PERMEATION

Section 58.1 of the *Education Act* requires a school board to give notice to a parent or guardian when courses of study, education programs, institutional materials, instruction or exercises include subject matter that deals primarily and explicitly with religion. All of the schools in this division are Catholic Separate Schools, the essential purpose of which is to fully permeate Catholic theology, philosophy, practices and beliefs, the principles of the Gospel and teachings of the Catholic Church, in all aspects of school life, including in the curriculum of every subject taught, both in and outside of formal religion classes, celebrations and exercises. Every course of study and educational program, all institutional materials, instruction and exercises will at all times include subject matter that deals primarily and explicitly with religion.



FAIR NOTICE LETTER

Dear Parents / Guardians,

The Holy Spirit Catholic School Division is committed to providing safe learning environments for all students, staff, school visitors and community members. When a student behaves inappropriately, principals use progressive discipline to help a student take responsibility for their actions, change their behavior and learn from their mistakes.

When students' behaviors pose a potential threat to safety or serious harm, the Southwest Alberta Regional Violence Threat Risk Assessment (VTRA) Protocol assists administrators in taking the necessary steps to protect the well-being of students and staff. This protocol ensures that schools can respond promptly to worrisome behaviors or threatening incidents, such as possession of a weapon or replica, bomb threats or plans, verbal, written, or electronic (internet, text) threats to harm oneself or others, as well as other acts of violence, including fire-setting.

The protocol requires trained division staff and community partners to work together as a team to complete an Assessment of Risk to Others (ARTO) whenever a student threatens to harm others. The ARTO process leverages the team's knowledge, skills, and experience to assess the level of concern and identify appropriate interventions to protect individuals from harm and ensure a safe environment in both the school and the community. A multi-disciplinary approach is used to address these concerns. Please be advised that the school team will take positive and proactive measures to address all known threats or high-risk behaviors. If you are invited to a meeting to discuss safety concerns about your child, please be assured that our protocol is being followed and that our primary goal is ensuring safety.

The Southwest Alberta Regional VTRA Protocol outlines how a school should respond immediately to threatening behavior. Principals may first assemble a School Threat Assessment Team, ideally comprising the principal or associate principal, a school-based counselor or jurisdictional lead, and local police. If the situation is serious, the principal may also consult the Superintendent of Schools and involve members of the Community Threat Assessment Team. This team may include representatives from local police, children's mental health organizations, or Child and Family Services, among other community agencies that collaborate with us to enhance school safety. Parents/guardians will be notified as soon as possible during the Stage I - VTRA Process. If parents/guardians cannot be reached, but a safety concern persists, the threat assessment may proceed. Personal information shared during this process will respect and balance each individual's right to privacy with the need to ensure everyone's safety.

This letter complies with procedure 2 of Administrative Procedure 322: Violence Threat / Risk Assessment (V-TRA) Protocol, which states that parents/ guardians will be provided with "fair notice" that each threat will be taken seriously. St. Augustine of Hippo 354-430 (Feast Day: August 28)

St. Augustine of Hippo was an unlikely saint, but a very influential one. Living between 354 and 430 AD in what is today Algeria, St. Augustine became a Doctor of the Church, meaning that his influence on Catholic theology and philosophy was vast and enduring. His writings, including City of God and Confessions remain important works to study even today.

However, St. Augustine was not always so religious. He was born into an upper class family with a devout mother, Monica (who later became a saint herself), but in his youth lived wildly and rejected his Christian upbringing. A brilliant student, Augustine lived in Carthage, Rome, and Milan while completing his education and beginning to work as a professor. With the constant prayer of his mother, Augustine returned to Christianity and was influenced greatly by Ambrose of Milan, the Bishop (and later also a saint).

A key moment in his conversion was his reading of the letter of St. Paul to the Romans. After being baptized in 387, Augustine returned to Hippo the following year and became first a priest, and then the Bishop of Hippo by 395. He was well known for his sermons, which were engaging (and often quite lengthy). For the last 35 years of his life, he preached constantly and dedicated himself to the conversion of his local people to Christianity, and became known for many of his contributions to the development of Christian thought. But he was also highly practical and focused on the needs of those around him, as expressed in this quotation:

"What does love look like? It has the hands to help others. It has the feet to hasten to the poor and needy. It has eyes to see misery and want. It has the ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of men. That is what love looks like."

The Apostles' Creed

As part of our call to *Proclaim* this year, we are going to focus on elements of the Apostles' Creed each month, starting with an overview of creeds in general. A creed is a summary of beliefs; it comes from the Latin word Credo, which means "I believe." We are likely familiar with the Apostles' Creed or the Nicene Creed, which are the two main Creeds that we use in the Catholic Mass. While we say in these creeds "I believe," we do that alongside all of our brothers and sisters in faith, a unifying proclamation of what it is that we believe in. The creeds are combinations of historical truths with statements of faith, and have been derived over time from the earliest Christians.

In Lumen Fidei, Pope Francis writes that:

"Faith is necessarily ecclesial; it is professed from within the body of Christ as a concrete communion of believers...Faith is not a private matter, a completely individualistic notion or a personal opinion: it comes from hearing, and it is meant to find expression in words and to be proclaimed...Faith...enables us to become part of the Church's great pilgrimage through history until the end of the world."

As we seek to become Pilgrims of Hope this year, let us contemplate the Creed, and how our proclamation of the Creed unites us to one another and to all Christians through time and space.



"Proclaiming" In Our Schools



22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

"This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me..." — Mark 7:6

Gospel Reading: Mark 8:27-35

"Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me." — Mark 8:34

Gospel Reading: Mark 9:30-37

"Where jealousy and selfish ambition exist, there is disorder...the wisdom from above is first of all pure, then peaceable, gentle...the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace for those who cultivate peace." — James 3:16-18

Do I find myself living in the wisdom God gives, in peace and gentleness and the other gifts of the Holy Spirit that I received at my baptism? Or do I find myself more often wrapped up in my wants: wanting my own way, wanting what others have, etc.? Gospel Reading: Mark 9:38-43,45,47-48

Jesus' disciples were upset that some other people who weren't followers of Jesus were doing good things for him. They thought they were special because they were in the "in" crowd by following Jesus but the others weren't. Everyone who does good things and lives lovingly is on Jesus' side, even if they don't say they are following Jesus!
