

# Family Inquiry Advent Calendar



The month of Advent gives us a chance to reflect on the themes of hope, peace, joy, and love as we wait for Jesus. We invite you to explore these ideas through our key concepts in the IB PYP: Form, Function, Causation, Change, Connection, Perspective, and Responsibility!

HOBE

Take a moment as a family to read Isaiah 9:6. Inquiry: How does this prophecy function to give hope?

Make a card for someone who miaht need encouragement. Inquiry: How are we **responsible** to share hope with others?

Build a prayer jar: decorate a iar and add slips of paper with people or things to pray for during Advent. Consider how your prayers might change things.

Make Christmas ornaments out of symbols of hope. Talk about the **form** and **function** of each symbol: what is it and why does it represent hope?

- favorite Christmas songs to add to a family playlist. **Inquiry:** What messages of hope do you hear? How does hope form these songs?
- advent wreath out of paper, clay, or plants. Light the first candle.

Inquiry: What causes hope in our family?

Have a family play date outside. Ask everyone to name one thing that changes in winter and how it will change back in spring.

8 PEACE Read John 14:27 as a family. Inquiry: What does Jesus mean when le said he left us peace? And how can we connect to others to share that peace?

9 Create ornaments out of paper. Write something vou're grateful for on each one and hang it on your tree. Keep a arateful perspective!

Bundle up, go outside, and look at the stars with some hot chocolate!

Inquiry: How do the stars connect evervone to God's promises?

Build a fort with pillows and blankets where you can read a story. **Inquiry:** How would our **perspective** change (how would we see this fort differently) if we had to live in it?

- 12 Turn on the Christmas lights. put on quiet music, and encourage everyone to hold a peaceful perspective for a few minutes. End your time in prayer!
- 13 Build a peace puzzle: make a family piece of art on cardboard that shows ways we can cause peace. **Inquiry:** Cut it into pieces and try to reassemble it!
- 14 Bake a batch of cookies and share them with a neighbor. **Inquiry:** As you bake, discuss the function of the instructions and inaredients!

Read Luke 2: 8-14 as a family. Inquiry: How are

we **responsible** for our own joy this holiday season?

Create a family joke book. Have everyone write down their favorite iokes and draw pictures. Read one joke a night at suppertime to share family connection.

17 Put out cups of water. milk. and vinegar and try to change the form of candy canes by dissolving them! **Inquiry:** Find out what candy canes symbolize!

Connect with each other by watching a Christmas movie together. Inquiry: What messages of joy do you see?

19 Clear out old toys and clothes and donate them to someone in need. Inquiry: How do we make responsible choices about what we buy and what we

donate?

20 Look up some Christmas dance videos on YouTube and have a family dance party! Inquiry: How do exercise and music **change** our perspective?

Talk about how our words cause joy or hurt. Fill a jar with kind compliments and leave it where anvone can take one if they're feeling sad!

Read John 3:16 as a family. **Inquiry:** How did God take the form of a child in Jesus? **23** Bake a birthday cake for Jesus and have a mini birthday party! **Inquiry:** How do different cultures celebrate birthdays? Why do we celebrate change?

24 Go for a Christmas lights walk or drive to see the displays. Inquiry: What is the function of a light display? How does it connect to Jesus as the light of the world?

Proclaim! Odile of Alsace, also referred to as Odilia or Ottilia, was born to a noble family in the Alsace area of what is today France. According to tradition, her family did not want her as she was born without sight, and she was raised by peasants in the area. Upon being baptised around the age of 12, she miraculously recovered her sight. She then moved around the area of what is today France, Switzerland, and Germany fleeing from her father. At one point, she is said to have lived in a cave that opened from the face of a cliff and hid her inside. Eventually, when her father fell ill, Odilia returned to the family to take care of him. It was then that he founded a monastery and convent. The convent, Niedermunster Abbey, was where Odilia died in about 720, after spending the rest of her life serving the poor and sick.

Almost immediately upon her death, both ordinary and noble people made pilgrimages to these locations seeking cures for the blind and partially sighted. Many miraculous cures were reported, which led to her sainthood. Despite her physical impairment, her faith, devotion to God, and service to those around her are a powerful witness to all of us. Holy Spirit actually has two connections to St. Odilia! The first is our ongoing project with Chalice supporting St. Odilia School in Zambia with their construction of a new school classroom block. Donations are still being accepted <a href="here">here</a>. This school is one of the few schools in Zambia that serves children with visual impairments, physical disabilities, and albinism. We also have recently hosted an exchange program that welcomes students from Alsace, of which St. Odilia is the patron saint.

# The Apostles' Creed

"... [He] suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried..."

Have you ever noticed that in the Creed, we skip over all of the life of Christ to his death? The reason for this is likely because for the original disciples and apostles, these details were clear and recent, and addressed in other New Testament sources. This gap is especially striking in contrast to the specific and explicit historical reference to Pontius Pilate; which makes sense when you think of the function of the Creed in response to doctrinal confusion or disagreement. Finally, the reference to Christ's death is an important punctuation to his life. As Janet Schaeffler writes:

Jesus' death is an exclamation point of his profound love for us and of his unwavering obedience to the Father — the exclamation point to the way he lived his whole life.

What do we profess about Christ when we proclaim the Apostles' Creed?

 Christ was crucified — he suffered and was shamed, just as we suffer in our own lives;

- Christ died Christ died for us; to be a follower of Christ is to die every day, and rise every day;
- Christ was buried he shared fully in our human nature; like us, he was born, and died.

While in this season of Advent we prepare for the coming of Christ into our lives, we might also think about his ultimate destiny — born into actual history, to die for for us, and by so doing creating the promise of everlasting life with him.

As we seek to become Pilgrims of Hope this year, let us continue to contemplate the Creed, and how our proclamation of the Creed unites us to one another and to all Christians through time and space.

## "Proclaiming" In Our Schools

This month, we will be joining with the rest of the universal Church in beginning our celebration of the Jubilee Year — Pilgrims of Hope 2025. A jubilee year is historically significant to us going all the way back to our roots in Judaism. This year was to be marked every fifty years as an extra year (after every seven sets of seven years). The name derives from the instrument (a yobel, or ram's horn) which proclaimed the beginning of that year. The time was intended as a special time to right relationships with God, one another, and all of creation, involving the forgiveness of debts and leaving land fallow. The first Catholic Jubilee was declared in 1300, and our most recent Jubilee was a special year in 2015 declared by Pope Francis. The Jubilee will start with the opening of the Holy Door at St. Peter's Basilica on Christmas Eve. For more information, you can visit the official website here.

# Gospel Readings

December 1, 2024 1st Sunday in Advent

### Gospel Reading: Luke 21:25-28, 34-36

"May the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all... to be blameless in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." — 1 Thessalonians 3: 12-13

All of us anticipate this time of year when Advent begins, looking forward to all the fun that is to come at Christmas time. Dear Lord, thank you for the chance to prepare our hearts for your coming each year in Advent. Please help us to share your love with those who need it most this year.


December 8, 2024 2nd Sunday in Advent

### Gospel Reading: Luke 3:1-6

"...the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Christ Jesus." — Philippians 1:6

December 9, 2024

Feast of the Immaculate Conception

### Gospel Reading: Luke 1:26-38

"Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus." — Luke 1:30-31

Mary was very special to God. She found favor with him. We don't know anything about her before the angel Gabriel asked her to be the mother of Jesus, but she must have been a very good person to be asked to do that. She must have had a lot of practice doing the right things and saying "yes" to God if she was able to say yes for such a big thing.
